

Programs/Initiatives

High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)¹⁰
Designated in 1996, the Midwest HIDTA consists of counties in Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota. In Nebraska, the Midwest HIDTA is responsible for the following counties: Dakota, Dawson, Dodge, Douglas, Gage, Hall, Jefferson, Lancaster, Madison, Platte, Sarpy and Scotts Bluff.

Crime and Drug-Related Crime

➤ During 2007, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) reported making 132 arrests for drug violations in Nebraska. 11

➤ Preliminary data indicate that there were 62,420 index offenses known to police in Nebraska during 2006. This is a 2% decrease from 63,809 in 2005. 12

Drugs

➤ Cocaine¹⁵

Cocaine remains readily available in the larger cities of Nebraska and is abused by all social and ethnic groups.

➤ Heroin¹⁶

While not considered a drug of choice in Nebraska, some Hispanic trafficking organizations have heroin available for consumer use.

- ➤ Marijuana¹⁷
 - Marijuana is readily available throughout the major cities in Nebraska. The marijuana available in the state includes marijuana from Mexico and from sources in the state of Washington.
- ➤ Methamphetamine ¹⁸
 - Methamphetamine is the major concern for law enforcement within the state of Nebraska. The availability of imported methamphetamine is stable in all areas of Nebraska with a negligible presence of local low-yield labs in the rural areas.
- ➤ Club Drugs¹⁹
 - The popularity of club drugs continues to be a concern to law enforcement and to local communities. There is a perception among users that these drugs are "safe" to use.
- Diverted Pharmaceuticals²⁰
 OxyContin is widely available throughout Nebraska. "Pharming" parties are becoming popular among junior high and high school students, where controlled pharmaceuticals are traded and abused.
- According to 2005-2006 data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH), approximately 102,000 (7%) of Nebraska citizens (ages 12 or older) reported past month use of an illicit drug.²¹

- Approximately 593,000 (41.14%) Nebraska citizens reported that using marijuana occasionally (once a month) was a "great risk". 22
- Additional 2005-2006 NSDUH results indicate that 34,000 (2.36%) Nebraska citizens reported illicit drug dependence or abuse within the past year. Approximately 26,000 (1.78%) reported past year illicit drug dependence.²³

Juveniles

➤ According to 2005-2006 NSDUH data, approximately 9% of Nebraska 12-17 year olds reported past month use of an illicit drug. 24

Enforcement

As of October 31, 2007, there were 4,693 full-time law enforcement employees in Nebraska (3,408 officers and 1,285 civilian employees). 25

Trafficking and Seizures

- Nebraska serves as a transshipment point for Mexican methamphetamine. Interstate 80 provides traffickers with easy west to east access across the state. 26
- ➤ Preliminary investigations show that organizations in Nebraska have been receiving multi-hundred to thousand dosage units of MDMA (ecstasy) from Texas, Florida and Arizona.²⁷
- ➤ During 2007, the DEA and state and local authorities in Nebraska reported 16 methamphetamine laboratory incidents. ²⁸

➤ During 2007, there were 1,203 cultivated marijuana plants eradicated in Nebraska under the DEA's Domestic Cannabis Eradication/Suppression Program. ³⁰

Courts

- ➤ Drug Courts³¹
 - As of April 16, 2007, there were 20 drug courts in existence or being planned in Nebraska. Ten drug courts had been operating for at least two years, 4 had recently been implemented and 6 were being planned at that time.
- ➤ During FY 2007, approximately 53.9% of the Federally-sentenced defendants in Nebraska had committed drug offenses. More than 60% of the drug cases involved methamphetamine.³²

Corrections

- ➤ On June 6, 2008, there were 4,408 inmates within Nebraska Department of Correctional Services (DCS) facilities.³³
- ➤ On June 1, 2008, drug offenses were reported as the most serious offense for 30.1% of the female and 14.2% of the male inmates within Nebraska DCS facilities. ³⁴

[➤] Substance abuse treatment programs available through DCS:³⁶

- Residential Treatment Services: focus on recovery, relapse prevention and transitions issues with an additional emphasis on criminal attitudes and behaviors.
- Non-Residential Services: These programs address the needs of inmates during the course of their sentences who, due to the nature of their sentences, or due to the nature of their problems, are not eligible for treatment services in the residential treatment programs.

Treatment

➤ During 2007, there were 15,416 admissions to drug/alcohol treatment in Nebraska.³⁷ There were 14,968 such treatment admissions in 2006.³⁸ During 2005, there were 15,189 treatment admissions in Nebraska.³⁹
